St. Thomas Lutheran Church - Streetsboro, Ohio

Throughout our post-Easter reflections on the resurrection narratives, we have heard Jesus again and again refer to something that was coming. On Pentecost Sunday, we got to celebrate that predicted event. Throughout this month of June (and beyond) we reflect on the meaning of that event for our lives and the life of the Church.

The event is the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, which Jesus promised the Twelve and us would happen. He told them and us how wonderful it would be. He prayed for the Twelve to be filled, and He is praying for us to be filled even now.

We see what being filled with the Holy Spirit meant to the early Church: their lives were transformed. They were turned from frightened cowards to bold proclaimers of Christ. Thousands of people heard and responded to this message. Miracles were performed in Jesus' name. Sins were forgiven; lives made new and whole.

The manifestation of the Holy Spirit stirred an awakening in the disciples like nothing else ever had or could. It also changed the world. Inside of one generation, the message of Christ's victory over death and sin had spread across the Mediterranean Sea, as far west as England, as far east as India, north to the Black Sea, south across the continent of Africa.

It makes one contemplate: "Why did the Holy Spirit leave?" The wonders of those early years do not seem to occur with such regularity today. Thousands are not pouring into our church. Miracles seem in rather short supply. The power of disciples witnessing their faith has ebbed.

Yet... lives are still being changed. Sins are forgiven even now. The newness and wholeness that the Spirit brought then is still at work today. What accounts for the apparent dynamism of the past and the calmness of the present? Is it something we have done or failed to do? Has God stopped doing the things He did in the past?

It would be hard to say that God has changed, so it appears that something has changed in us and in the Church at large. Is it apathy? A lack of faith? Fear? Ignorance? All of the above? Do we care whether or not the Gospel is brought to all people? Are we unsure that God will do this today? Are we concerned that we might be the ones called to do it? Do we not understand how it works?

Many of us are unsure about the Holy Spirit. We relate to God as Father, because we have known fathers. The human Jesus is very accessible. But the Spirit is not so easily embraced. Consequently we shy away from talking about the Spirit, and close ourselves off from the working of the Spirit.


We fail to see that the Spirit has already done work in us: we believe. This is the Spirit's greatest gift. We have forgiveness and thus eternal life—also the work of the Spirit. We are shaped by the Sacraments—the Spirit at work. But we balk at being used powerfully by the Spirit to bring to others these wonderful experiences of grace.

As we gather around God's Word and Sacraments in the coming months, we need to use this time

to allow ourselves to be shaped by the Spirit's presence. We need to discover how the Spirit is gifting each of us for the work of ministry. We need to learn to rejoice in, and not draw back from, our calling to worship, to study, to witness, and to serve.

"When the Spirit of truth comes," Jesus promised the disciples, "he will guide you into all the truth ..." (John 16:13) Thus we will know what is true about Jesus, about faith, about grace — and we will know what is true about ourselves. We are endowed by the Spirit to do great things in Jesus' Name. Let's rejoice in that Let's get on with it!
