"Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away." (Matt. 24:35) Through the passage of thousands of years the Holy Scriptures, the word of God, come to us today. As I wrote in our last newsletter article, we are blessed with thousands of manuscripts that help us reconstruct with a high degree of certainty what autographs (the first copies of the writings) said. It is these autographs, the Holy Scriptures written for us by the prophets and apostles, that we confess to be the inspired, infallible, and inerrant word of God for all matters of faith and life. With the manuscripts we have we can reconstruct with certainty about 99.5% of the original text. The aspects of the Holy Scriptures that we are unable to reconstruct (that small .5%) have no effect on articles of the Christian faith. They include

unimportant issues such as "Which Greek word for love did St. Paul use in this passage?" Etc.

Differences have entered into the copies of Holy Scriptures because whereas the original writers were preserved from error in matters of faith and doctrine the scribes (the people who made hand-written copies of the Scriptures) were not preserved from copying errors (writing the same verse twice, skipping over a line, or misremembering). Such human errors explain the vast majority of differences we find in manuscripts (handwritten copies) of the Bible. Sometimes scribes would intentionally add passages would be added to the Bible. These passages were added for several reasons: to express more clearly the teaching of Holy Scripture, to smooth over differences within the text, or to include an account that was believed to go back to the apostles and first eyewitnesses. Notice that when passages were intentionally added to the Scriptures it was not done with malicious intent, but to edify the Christian Church.

The most well-known addition to the Scriptures is probably the longer ending of Mark (Mark 16:9-20). It was added to the Gospel of Mark sometime during the second century A.D. because someone thought that it was strange that Mark (unlike the other gospels) did not have an account of our Lord's appearances to His disciples after His resurrection. However, when we look at this longer ending, there is nothing found therein that contradicts the teaching of Holy Scripture elsewhere. The longer rending of Mark proclaims Scriptural truths such as baptism saves (Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21), the risen Jesus has commissioned His Church to proclaim the Gospel to all the world (Mark 16:15; Matt. 28:19-20; Luke 24:47; John 20:21), and the Lord continued to perform miraculous signs through His apostles (Mark 16:17-18; John 14:12; Acts 5:12). As a matter of fact, one of the reasons New Testament scholars know that the longer ending of Mark was added later, is because it is a clear harmonization of the accounts of our risen Lord's appearances found in Matthew, Luke, and John. Was it written by Mark? No! Is it the word of God? Yes, because it proclaims the exact same thing taught in the rest of Scripture.

Other passages that have been added over time include 1 John 5:7 ("For there are three that bear witness in heaven, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Spirit, and these three are one...") and the story of the woman caught in adultery (John 7:53-8:11). The passage from 1 John confesses the Holy Trinity (that there is one God who exists as three persons), a divine truth taught elsewhere in Scripture in the accounts of our Lord's Baptism (where the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit appear as three distinct persons) and the risen Lord's commission to baptize "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matt. 28:19; notice that there is one name shared by three persons). For whatever reason (we don't know why) some scribe added an additional confession of the Holy Trinity to 1 John. The story of the woman caught in adultery is not found in our earliest copies of the Gospel of John (and as a matter of fact it is sometimes found in copies of the Gospel of Luke!).

Even here, though, we merely encounter the truths already contained in Scripture: all human beings have sinned (John 8:7; Romans 3:23), the Lord forgives sins (John 8:11; Mark 2:5), and He has compassion on all sinners, even adulterers (John 8:4; John 4:18). Moreover, the story of Jesus and the woman caught in adultery likely record a historical event because Papias, a follower of one of Jesus' disciples, knew of this story himself.

What we find in these passages added to Holy Scripture, then, are not distortions of scriptural truths but further corroborations of what Holy Scripture already teaches in abundance elsewhere. Such variations and differences in the texts are reflected in our many English translations. The King James Version includes passages that are not found in the English Standard Version and The New American Standard Bible. These differences are not the result of dishonesty and a desire to mislead people. Rather, differences in the text and translation result from the good and honest work of various committees of translators and biblical scholars entrusted with the important task of reconstructing the original text of the Bible and then translating it into English. It shouldn't surprise us that when you have two or three people gathered for the same task that there will be differences in opinions and results. (Sometimes there are differences in opinions and results when only one person is at work, just ask me). Nonetheless, even with these scribal errors, additions, changes, and differences in translation, one thing is still certain: The Triune God in His mercy and out of love for us has preserved His Word and divine truth revealed in the Holy Scriptures for us today. Rooted in Christ, Growing in Stewardship

The heartland is now awash in various hues of green. The doldrums of winter give way to the colors of spring. Now, the promise of spring gives way to the growth of summer. Fields are planted and sprouted. Gardens are planted. Flowers adorn the beds of neighborhood homes and roadside ditches. Green is the shade of life! Green growth is also the hue of the faithful steward. The seed of faith planted in human hearts in the waters of Holy Baptism grows as it is nurtured in the Word proclaimed and ingested in the Holy Supper. This faith does indeed save. But our stewardship of the Gospel is also designed to bear fruit for God's glory and the benefit of our neighbor.

To consider this, let us look at the hymn, "Fruitful Trees, the Spirits Sowing" (LSB 691). It is very much a stewardship hymn!

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's sowing, May we ripen and increase, Fruit to life eternal growing, rich in love and joy and peace.

- The tree of faith is not planted in us by us. It is the Spirit's work! We do not claim the title "steward." Rather, we are created for it (Gen. 1:26–28).
- He is the One who makes it grow in us. The fruits of the Spirit are borne out because we, by grace through faith, are connected to the vine that is Jesus (John 15).

Laden branches freely bearing Gifts the Giver loves to bless; Here is fruit that grows by sharing, Patience, kindness, gentleness.

- Our stewardship is NOT about what we do. It is about what the Holy Spirit does in and through us. That is the fruit that we bear. His fruit for His purposes.
- But that fruit is lived out through us. The world sees the fruit of our stewardship of the Gospel in lives lived connected to Word and Sacrament.

Rooted deep in Christ our Master, Christ our pattern and our goal, Teach us, as the years fly faster, Goodness, faith, and self-control.

- Stewards have been created and redeemed to reflect the image of Jesus in the world. He is the pattern. We reflect to others around us the Light of the Gospel He has shone on us.
- This reflection comes when Christ's goodness flows from us to others.

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's tending, May we grow till harvests cease; Till we taste, in life unending, Heaven's love and joy and peace.

- Just as the Spirit has created us for stewardship of the Gospel, so also does He cause our faithfulness! He calls, gathers, enlightens, sanctifies and KEEPS us in this faithful stewardship of the Gospel.
- The ultimate goal of our faithful stewardship is eternity. For us. For our neighbor. All worked out by the Spirit.

Green is the color of the world right now. It is also the color of our stewardship and it is growing in us as we are connected to the vine, Jesus! God grant our growth in Him!


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MORE THAN A MOM
