My grandmother died months before Ruth and I got married. Her absence wasn't as notable on our wedding day (after all, there's a lot going on the day of the wedding). A couple of weeks after the wedding, when we were opening our wedding presents, that's when it hit me. My grandma had gifted us her Rose of Sharon Quilt, her prized possession and something she had worked very hard to make. The quilt came with a card she had written. Hearing her voice (not literally of course) through the card reminded me that something was missing. I wouldn't hear something again on this side of eternity. Namely, the voice of my grandmother, whom I had spent many hours talking to throughout my childhood, adolescence, and early adulthood. It reminded me that there was someone missing in my life now. Life was less complete in some ways because she was no longer there. It was like my life was now scarred.

Maybe many of us feel that way after the death of a loved one, that our life is in some way scarred, though functional. We might miss our


grandparents, mother, father, brother, sister, husband, wife, etc. And although life keeps on going, we still miss them. Jesus' disciples certainly felt like their lives were irreparably scarred after the death of their Lord. They had left everything behind to follow Him. All of their dreams and hopes had found their rest in Him. After His death, they were lost and without direction. The words of the Emmaus disciples in the Gospel of Luke capture the way many of them probably felt: "But we had hoped that He [Jesus] was the one to redeem Israel..." (Luke 24:21) The death of our loved ones – whether expected or unexpected (Jesus' death should have been expected; He told His disciples about it several times) – can leave a hole in our life, a wound that might heal and become a scar, but the remnants of that loss will remain with us no matter how much time passes.

On All Saints' Day (November 1st), we remember that though we have lost loved ones, we do not mourn as those without a hope. As Christians, we can be certain that our loved ones who die, having trusted in Christ Jesus as their Savior and Lord, are now with Him. And that one day they will be raised bodily from the dead, just as surely as they died with Him in the waters of Holy Baptism (Romans 6:8). Our Lord has promised us this: "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live..." (John 11:25) What a great hope we have as Christians! Our confidence in the face of death and loss is not in our ability to overcome these things and make them right. Our confidence is in the one who conquered death through His bodily resurrection, the one who holds the keys to Hades, the one who promises to wipe every tear from our eyes, and the one who swears on Himself that He will make all things new.

Yes, we bear our scars in this life, life is not the same without the ones we have lost, but we know that the scars will not last forever. The disciples who grieved the loss of their Lord were consoled when He appeared to them in a transformed body, risen from the dead. Their tears gave way to joy. So too shall our tears give way to joy when we see our loved ones, who have departed in the faith, victorious over the power of death, standing before their risen Lord. On the day of resurrection, the scars in our life will finally disappear. For the Lord who gave us our life shall restore our life to the point that it will never again be subject to death, sorrow, sin, and pain. Now we mourn and bear our scars; and at the same time, we continue to live our life, knowing that our loved ones would not want us to spend it wasting away in grief over them, and that even more so, one day we shall see those who have departed in the faith again. Happy All Saints' Day!

Not the labor of my hands Can fulfill Thy Law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears forever flow, All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and Thou alone. (LSB 761:2)

While the classic hymn "Rock of Ages" shows up in the *Lutheran* Service Book in the "Hope and Comfort" section, it can also teach us a valuable lesson about Christian stewardship. If that surprises you, stay with me on this one.

No Lutheran would ever dispute the fact that our work does not save us. Ephesians 2 makes it truly clear that we are dead in our trespasses and sins and would remain in that state until Christ raises us by grace. There is not a ladder on which we can climb out of the grave that our sins have dug for us. No blood, sweat nor tears will be able to rescue us. We all know this.

Our works do not save. Christ's work on the cross of Calvary does! He bore human flesh. He carried the burden of our sin to the cross. His body was beaten, bruised and bloodied for us. He has indeed atoned for us! This is more than enough reason for this hymn to be bouncing around in your head all day today!

But our work has a place. The place is in response to what the Father has done for us in Jesus. The Rock of Ages, who is Jesus, becomes the foundation on which our lives of faith are built. The Holy Spirit uses the means of grace to make us God's workmanship that Paul talks about in Ephesians 2:10.

Our workmanship does not display our power or prowess. Like the heavens declare the handiwork of the Creator, the works of a redeemed sinner point others to the salvation that is worked only by Jesus alone. Our work is a response to and reflection of a grace and glory that we ourselves could never accomplish or achieve.

We become stewards of the treasure that is the Gospel. When we faithfully support the work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our financial support, we are doing the work which points to the One who alone atones. When we come alongside a struggling sister or brother for whom Christ died and we share the stewardship work of compassion and care, we enflesh the treasure of God's love and redemption. When we make it a weekly priority to arrange our schedule to be in the Lord's House with other stewards of the Gospel to receive again and again the Gospel's precious gift, we are stewards of the Body of Christ in the congregation that points even more people to Jesus.

We cannot do this. Jesus does it through us. We are simply stewards of this precious treasure!
